The filing fee for a small claims action is as follows:

Filing a claim for \$1,500.00 or less.....	\$30.00
Filing a claim for more than \$1,500.00 but less than or equal to \$5,000.00.....	\$50.00
Filing a claim for more than \$5,000.00 but less than or equal to \$10,000.00.....	\$75.00
(Claim by natural persons only)	
Filing a claim by a person who has filed more than 12 small claims in California within the previous 12 months.....	\$100.00
Service by clerk for certified mail, to each defendant.....	\$15.00

If you have a claim for more than this amount, you may sue in the civil division of the trial court or you may sue in the small claims court and give up your right to the amount over the limit.

You cannot file more than two cases in small claims court for more than \$2,500.00 each during a calendar year.

- Bring all sets to the court. Make sure they are stapled and contain all **(5)** mandatory pages of form SC-100.
- All forms must be neat and easy to read. The clerk can refuse copies if not complete and in proper order.
